Should the student fail to complete their programme within that time, their candidature will be terminated with an exit award commensurate with the credit attained. In exceptional circumstances, and with permission of the Deputy Head of School (Education) or delegate, a student may be permitted up to a maximum of one additional year to complete the programme.

Part time PGDip Programmes

The maximum duration for the part-time PGDip programmes is 4 years inclusive of any period of suspension. In exceptional circumstances, and with permission of the Deputy Head of School (Education) or delegate, a student may be permitted up to a maximum of one additional year to complete the programme.

Part time PGCert Programmes

The maximum duration for the part-time PGCert programmes is 3 years inclusive of any period of suspension.

Programme:

Master of Science Neonatology Part time (8091)

The maximum duration for the part-time MSc Neonatology is 3 years inclusive of any period of suspension and/or repeat. Should the student fail to complete their programme within that time, their candidature will be terminated with an exit award commensurate with the credit attained. In exceptional circumstances, and with permission of the Deputy Head of School (Education) or delegate, a student may be permitted up to a maximum of one additional year to complete the programme.

These regulations should be read in conjunction with the programme specification.
